


High Yield Goes Beyond Corporates

Proven Team and Process



30-Day SEC Yield: The 30-Day SEC Yield is a standardized yield computed by dividing the net investment income per share earned during the past 30-day period by the share price at the end of the period, expressed as an annual percentage rate. The SEC yield does not include prepayment income, which could be a significant contribution to yield.

Bloomberg U.S. Corporate High Yield Index: An unmanaged market value-weighted index that covers the universe of fixed-rate, non-investment grade debt.

Sharpe Ratio: A statistical measure that uses standard deviation and excess return to determine reward per unit of risk. A higher Sharpe ratio implies a better historical risk-adjusted performance. The Sharpe ratio has been calculated since inception using the 3-month Treasury bill for the risk-free rate of return.

Yield-to-Worst (YTW): The lowest potential yield that can be received on a bond without the issuer actually defaulting.

The Angel Oak High Yield Opportunities ETF is the Successor Fund to the Angel Oak High Yield Opportunities Fund, which was reorganized into the ETF on 2/16/24. As a result of the conversion, the Fund adopted the accounting and performance history of its predecessor mutual fund which had an inception date of 3/31/09. The NAV returns shown prior to 2/16/24, reflect the NAV of the predecessor mutual fund's Institutional shares. Performance for the mutual fund has not been adjusted to reflect the ETF's expenses. Had the mutual fund been structured as an ETF, its performance may have differed. The ETF has the same investment objective and investment strategy as the mutual fund, and performance of the ETF may differ from that of the Fund.

As of 12/31/24, the Angel Oak High Yield Opportunities ETF (AOHY) received a Morningstar rating based on risk-adjusted returns of 5 stars overall, 4 stars for the three-year period, 4 stars for the five-year period, and 5 stars for the ten-year period among 580, 580, 539, and 421 high yield bond funds. The Morningstar Rating™ for funds, or "star rating", is calculated for managed products (including mutual funds, variable annuity and variable life subaccounts, exchange-traded funds, closed-end funds, and separate accounts) with at least a three-year history. Exchange-traded funds and open-ended mutual funds are considered a single population for comparative purposes. It is calculated based on a Morningstar Risk-Adjusted Return measure that accounts for variation in a managed product's monthly excess performance, placing more emphasis on downward variations and rewarding consistent performance. The Morningstar Rating does not include any adjustment for sales loads. The top 10% of products in each product category receive 5 stars, the next 22.5% receive 4 stars, the next 35% receive 3 stars, the next 22.5% receive 2 stars, and the bottom 10% receive 1 star. The Overall Morningstar Rating for a managed product is derived from a weighted average of the performance figures associated with its three-, five-, and 10-year (if applicable) Morningstar Rating metrics. The weights are: 100% three-year rating for 36-59 months of total returns, 60% five-year rating/40% three-year rating for 60-119 months of total returns, and 50% 10-year rating/30% five-year rating/20% three-year rating for 120 or more months of total returns. While the 10-year overall star rating formula seems to give the most weight to the 10-year period, the most recent three-year period actually has the greatest impact because it is included in all three rating periods.

Morningstar Rankings represent a fund's total return percentile rank relative to all funds in the same Morningstar Category for the same time period. The highest (or most favorable) percentile rank is 1%, and the lowest (or least favorable) percentile rank is 100%. It is based on Morningstar total return, which includes both income and capital gains or losses and is not adjusted for sales charges or redemption fees.

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
